Measures include (but are not limited to):

				 Examining and removing barriers to admission to crisis services, psychiatric facilities, detoxification services and recovery residences. Immediately removing barriers to permanent supportive housing and creating pathways to its development. Providing treatment for nonviolent individuals in the custody of jails when diversion is recommended by a prosecutor and approved by a judge. Funding the hiring and training of 20 additional intensive case managers within the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Behavioral Health to provide outreach and support from the time individuals are homeless or incarcerated through when they are successfully housed. Requiring real-time reporting to the Department of Health and Human Services of available treatment beds in psychiatric facilities and community-based residential treatment facilities in order to highlight and address the challenges of serving individuals in need of treatment.
